

EARL TAYLOR, JR.

CONSTITUTIONAL CONVERSATION AMERICA'S FIVE THOUSAND YEAR LEAP

In this presentation Earl Taylor will describe the discovery of the Principles of Liberty during a "trial and error" period between 1607 and 1787 and the institutionalization of these principles into America's founding documents. It was this process that propelled our nation's progress further in 200 years than mankind has gone in more than 5000 years before. The acceleration of progress even came as a surprise to America's



founders! Can it happen again? Earl Taylor will address this question.

Earl Taylor, Jr. has taught The Making of America Constitutional Study course to thousands of people over the past thirty years throughout the nation. He has developed other study courses for a wide range of participants, from high school students to state legislators. Mr. Taylor graduated from Arizona State University with a degree in corporate finance. He built a real estate and development business over a period of eighteen years. In 1995, Mr. Taylor was asked to serve as President of the National Center for Constitutional Studies.

Along with writing a special study guide for the Boy Scouts to help them earn their Citizenship merit badges and helping structure courses on the U.S. Constitution for college recertification of public school teachers, Mr. Taylor established one of the first charter high schools in Arizona - Heritage Academy, where he has developed a special curriculum for the teaching of hundreds of students about the Founding Fathers.

TUNNEL OF OPPRESSION Weaner Center, McMaster Gym

The Tunnel of Oppression is a grassroots campus diversity initiative originally developed at Western Illinois University. The initiative stemmed from a homogeneous campus environment searching for a way to bring the realities of oppression into a full sensory experiential manner. The creators of the Tunnel of Oppression wanted to give participants the opportunity to see, touch, hear and feel the realities of oppression as a stepping stone towards creating diversity awareness. The tunnel is loosely based off of the Museum of Tolerance in Los Angeles, Calif.

Since its original development in the 1990s, the Tunnel of Oppression has become a nationally recognized program that has been recreated at a number of college campuses such as The Ohio State University, UNLV, the University of Wisconsin, Bradley University and the University of Maryland, College Park.

The Tunnel of Oppression has been both criticized and praised by Student Affairs administrators nationwide. It's often shocking and disturbing to those who have never experienced blatant forms of discrimination and oppression. Strong feelings can be evoked as a result of the full-sensory experience and may also be upsetting to those who have witnessed the realities of the images presented. Strong critics argue that a negative, shock-provoking portrayal of oppression is an inappropriate path to take in diversity programming. However, people must realize that the scenes depicted in the Tunnel represent reality for those living it as a daily experience. Maintaining an open mind is a must.
